Watch & Pray: Retreat with Movies - TUESDAYS WITH MORRIE reflection by Fr. George Vallocherill, SJ

This is a TV movie about a retired teacher named Morrie Schwartz who is slowly dying of Lou Gehrig's disease. Instead of being miserable about his inevitable death, Morrie has accepted it. An old pupil of his, Mitch Albom, has come to visit Morrie after hearing of his sickness on the news. Morrie starts to teach Mitch about his ideas on the meaning of life. He says "When we learn to die, we learn to live." When you can accept that you will die someday, you live life differently. He also says to forgive everyone before it is too late and to love everyone. "We must love one another, or die."

Accomplished sports writer Mitch Albom (Hank Azaria) feels that his life is lacking, despite his success. When Mitch watches a television interview with his former university professor, Morrie Schwartz (Jack Lemmon), he is moved to reconnect with his old mentor, who is struggling with Lou Gehrig's disease. As Mitch and Morrie get reacquainted, they engage in thoughtful conversations about a variety of significant topics, including love, happiness and death. Morrie is an extremely lovable college professor who—in his late sixties—finds out that he is dying. The story of his last few weeks on earth is told by Mitch, one of Morrie's former students, who happens to bump into him during his final days.

Morrie has been diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease. It destroys his muscles, making him weaker and weaker until his lungs can no longer support him and he dies. He and his wife prepare for this new life. How? He starts opening up his home to visitors, reaching out to everyone he knows. Meanwhile, Mitch has been living kind of a mediocre life. He isn't happy. He is pretty much a workaholic who doesn't even have time for his would be wife. Luckily Mitch happens to come across his old professor being interviewed by Nightline on ABC.

Mitch visits Morrie on the first of many Tuesdays. At first he's a bit taken aback by how frail Morrie is and worries that he's made the wrong decision by visiting, but that fear begins to melt pretty quickly. They end up chatting for hours, as if no time has passed between them, and Morrie is able to convince Mitch to come back and visit next week.

This final course with Morrie consists of discussions about important things: friendship, love, loss, death, and so on. As the weeks pass, Morrie's body grows weaker, though he fights every day to stay positive for the people he loves. As Mitch watches his friend suffer, his own heart gets stronger. He thinks deeply about the things around him, and starts reaching out to help take care of Morrie in an effort to show his concern. Finally, on their fourteenth Tuesday, they have to say goodbye. Morrie can barely speak and raises his hand to give Mitch a hug. It's a heartbreaking farewell indeed. Morrie passes away a few days later. To finish up, Mitch gives us his conclusion. It's a kind of retrospective on his "last class" with Morrie. His heart brims with gratitude for what Morrie did for him, and looking back, he only has one regret: that he didn't reach out to Morrie earlier. If he had, they might have had more Tuesdays together.

But there's more to the movie than the message -- a movie with nothing more than a message is bound to be boring. The real pleasure in watching this film is that the characters become more and more interesting and engaging along the way. It is not like other regular "disease movies" that would just make you feel guilty and miserable about not caring about its sick and ailing characters. This movie make you care about people like Morrie and Mitch around us. It is one of a kind film that teaches you to enjoy each day and not take anything for granted. It also teaches you about amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and its devastating effects on even the most fun-loving of people (Jack Lemmon) and how someone's illness and imminent death can affect those closest to the victim (family as well as close friends) in both a sad and positive way.

This movie has both a sad but beautiful ending in getting across the message that death is a part of living and shouldn't be feared. Maybe this message is too heavy for some of us, but all of us have to face up to it one day. When Morrie says goodbye to his "favorite pupil" on his deathbed one last time he says "I'll be buried by a beautiful oak tree, you talk, and I'll just listen."
